Biscuit Bear


We shared the story of Biscuit Bear and baked and decorated our own biscuit bears. We used the story

A hit has also been our cat calendar, which has formed a very important new part of our morning routine. We have learned about the countries in the United Kingdom, and several children seem to be planning their family holidays already! We have also been getting creative, working on the backgrounds for our sketchbooks and then using these to complement our sketches for our architecture unit. These really do make our artwork look special.





I am pleased to note that I have been impressed by how Year One are working on being kind and helpful towards one another, and they are learning about the impact their kind words have on



others, particularly in our writing unit for informal letters. It has been exciting to explore the new R.E curriculum together, and as well as listening and responding to stories from the Bible, other highlights have included our trip to visit the church, with the children being especially excited to see the stained-glass window in person.

Mrs M-J's singing lessons have been a real treat as well-what a wonderful way to begin our Wednesday mornings. Skylarks are always known for their beautiful singing, and the 2022 St. Laurence cohort is no exception!

Kingfishers have been working really hard this half term. They have produced some really lovely writing and especially enjoyed writing their non-chronological reports and formal invitations. The children have enjoyed learning about electricity in science and were especially interested in making circuits and experimenting with conductors and insulators. In Geography, we learnt about the British Isles and children used atlases to find out more facts. Finally, children did a wonderful job of painting their self-portraits and we were able to celebrate each child's uniqueness. Well done Kingfishers- we are all very proud of you!

Science lessons

In science, Quails class was learning about light, shadows and mirrors. We had a lot of fun using a laser to test if some school objects were opaque, transparent or translucent. We have also tested how images are formed in normal, concave and convex mirrors.

Art lessons

In art, the children had very exciting lessons. They have made their own sphinx using clay and an Egyptian necklace using macaroni and conchiglie pasta. They had the opportunity to revise what they learnt in history last term.



Geography and English

As children have learnt a lot about different rivers around the world, they used their knowledge to write a non-chronological report about three of their favourite rivers.

Computing

Quails class has also enjoyed their topic in computing: scratch. They have learnt how to use sprites, costumes, sounds and backdrops. At the end of the term, they created their own project using all they have learnt and the result was amazing.



Lent

As we started Lent, we have been following a Lent calendar with a variety of activities children can do to show kindness or to reflect during this very important period. One of them was to make a bookmark with the question Jesus has asked Simon Peter: Who would you say I am? Children reflected on the question and designed impressive bookmarks.

Swallow Class

Science

Our topic this term has been light. Working like scientists, the children planned and carried out an investigation to answer the question, 'Do shadows stay the same throughout the day?' The children had to think about the best ways to investigate things, how to make sure their investigation is fair, and how to record their findings.

Art

The children have really enjoyed their art (Art of Egypt) topic this term. They created their own sphinx from clay and used pasta and paint to make Egyptian collars

<u>Geography</u>

Swallow class has been studying the rivers of the world: As geographers they used maps and atlases to locate the river: the countries they journey through and described their features. We used a great AR app called (WWF Free Rivers) to bring rivers alive in the classroom. The children then used their knowledge to write a non-chronological report in their English lessons.

Computing

The children have become computer coders this term. For their final project they made a representation of a piano. They created code so that when the keys on a computer were pressed music played.

Dance

The children had great fun creating their machine dances! They enjoyed working

ups, sharing their ideas.

individually, with a partner and in small groups, sharing their ideas. They developed their use of counting and rhythm. They also learned to use canon, unison, formation and levels in their dances.

One highlight this term has been our science topic, which has looked at light. We completed one experiment, measuring our shadows at different times of the day to see how the shadows lengthen or shorten according to the sun's movements. We then conducted a second class experiment looking at how light affects the growth of plants. This has resulted in many questions, which might spark further investigations. Some of our experimenters are pictured below!







A further highlight this term has been studying the Vikings and their fantastic longboats. It turns out that they really were good at conducting surprise raids on the unsuspecting English; unfortunately they really did not wear horned helmets!


Magpies

Magpies have had a busy, but short half-term. In January we started swimming lessons and the pupils are becoming increasingly confident, as the weeks go by. Recently we have been practicing the shout Rescue and butterfly legs. In Science we have used tomatoes to get seeds and we are hoping to grow our own tomatoes. The pupils are going to try different methods and see what works. RE has been very successful this term and the pupils have written their own bidding prayers and creeds. Many of the creeds were amazing, well thought out and used beautiful vocab to show their understanding and reverence for the subject.

Lego Club

Over the past few weeks, the pupils have enjoyed making pictures, mazes, cars and robots. The pupils from different classes and year groups have been working together, but more importantly, talking, playing and sharing their ideas.









Owls class has had a wonderful and busy half-term. In our guided reading sessions, we delved into the inspiring book 'I am not a Label,' filled with captivating biographies of individuals who confronted and conquered unique challenges to pursue their dreams. These stories not only enhanced our learning but also provided valuable lessons in resilience, kindness, and teamwork. Meanwhile, in mathematics, the students dedicated their efforts to a focused study on fractions. Additionally, the students explored Australian and Egyptian cultures, weaving their discoveries into interesting and exciting narratives. The resilience displayed by the year 5's and 6's was particularly evident in their commitment to swimming and preparation for SATs. While there were numerous highlights throughout the term, two main standouts were the handson experience of dissecting a flower in Science and the creative process of crafting engaging quizzes on Scratch.

It has been busy and enjoyable half term in Kestrels class. All the children completed their assessments, and the results show really pleasing progress.

English

During our English lessons, we have been reading "I Am not a Label", by Cerrie Burnell. The children read about disabled role models and discussed their unique lives. They were also tasked with writing a formal letter of application where they were able to demonstrate use of persuasive language.

RE

In RE, we have been learning about Sacraments as seven meeting points with God and we were talking about what happens at Holly Mass.

On Wednesday 14th February, we shared a special afternoon. We attended Ash Wednesday Liturgy to mark the start of the holy season of Lent.

In Kestrels, children received 2024 Lenten Calendars to support them in their preparations for Easter.

As a part of our emotion coaching approach, we have introduced the TEAMS emotions board to help children to recognise their feelings and emotions and help them to response in effective way.




Science

St Laurence Parent Questionnaire for SEND

Thank you to the parents who completed the SEND questionnaire last month. The results will be fed back to the Governing Body and used to inform some of the actions in the SENCo action plan.

Results show that the majority of parents understand how the school provides for children with SEN and that the policy and website contain useful information for pupils. Parents know who to raise concerns with and feel that these are quickly addressed.

Areas to improve upon include access to extra-curricular activities and visits and listening to how children feel about their learning in school.

- Digital/internet safety 27 February 2024 (12:00-13:00) A workshop that considers why
 children and young people use digital technology and explains how we can keep them
 safe. Also, we will explore strategies to create and maintain digital boundaries and
 avoiding screen time battles.
- Supporting your child with feelings of worry Tuesday 5 March 2024 (12:00 13:30) A workshop that explores the definition of anxiety, its purpose and how it may affect children including advice around supporting children to understand how they are feeling and some strategies that may help them to manage these feelings.
- Supporting your child with feelings of anger Tuesday 12 March 2024 (12:00 13:30) A workshop that explores angry feelings including what is happening in our brain when we feel angry, how to explain this to children and some useful strategies to use when we have this difficult feeling.
- Sleep -Tuesday 19 March 2024 (12:00-13:00) A workshop that explores some common sleep difficulties, looks at sleep hygiene, bedtime routines and suggests some strategies that may help support your child to get a good night sleep.






