


St Laurence Catholic Primary School: Parents' Survey 2018

Our 2018 parents' survey was handed out at the March parents' evenings. The Governing Body reviewed the results of the survey at our meeting on 3rd May and was pleased to see the overwhelmingly positive feedback. Thank you to all of you who took the time to complete the survey; 115 completed surveys were returned. The survey contained 13 questions (the Ofsted Parent View questions). There was also an opportunity to make comments about the school (in the form of "2 stars and a wish"; see overleaf).

We have included responses from Senior Staff & Governors in italics.

Breakfast club The renovation of the former caretaker's house has now been completed and the school is currently talking to school-club providers about options for setting up a breakfast club; this would be from September 2018 at the earliest.	9
After school club As part of our discussions with school club providers, we are also exploring whether an after school club is feasible. At this stage, we do not yet know the outcome; our priority is the setting up of a breakfast club.	5
More after school extra-curricular clubs/wider range of after school clubs The range of clubs we offer is comparable to other similarly sized schools. For free clubs, we are reliant on volunteers or our staff giving up their own time. We do expect every teacher to run at least one club (either at lunchtime or after school) during the course of each year, but given the high workload our teachers have, we wouldn't want to ask them to do more than this. We also offer some clubs that you have to pay for: these run only if they're financially viable and we are aware of pressures on family budgets.	5
We always welcome parents/volunteers with a skill or hobby they would like to share through a club. Please contact the school office if you would like to run a club after half term or in the Autumn.	
Lunches (more choice, better food, more time to eat them, more fresh salads)	5
The Cambridgeshire Catering Service (CCS) which currently supplies our school meals will be closing at the end of the Autumn Term 2018. The school is currently putting our school lunches contract out to tender.
